E. M. Forster was a British novelist, essayiest, short story writer and a literary critic. His fame rests largely on his novels 'A Room with a View' (1908), 'Howards End' (1910) and 'A Passage to India' (1924). In 1914 he visited India. By this time he had written all except one of his novels. Forster spent a second spell in India in the early 1920s as the private secretary to Tukojirao III, the Maharaja of Dewas. The Hill of Devi' is his non-fictional account of this period. The book consists of the letters he wrote home during his two visits, with additional commentary analysing his experience in the country. After returning to London, he completed his last novel, 'A Passage to India'. It was selected as one of the 100 great works of 20th century English Literature.
